Another instrument the artist uses to tether us to the earth as he explores the realm of the spiritual is his approach to the face of the figures in his paintings. Every face in an Alvar painting is similar. The viewer can always identify a painting of Alvar Suñol by the way faces are portrayed. They are like 'spirit faces', showing the other worldliness of the figures. He gives us sight into their souls, rather than displaying unique facial feature with various hairstyles or colors, skin tones, chins, noses or ears. These spirit faces have uniformity and they all look the same. Their sameness gives us a stability to their humanity. We can see ourselves is every figurative depiction in every Alvar painting because of this. The figures are spiritual yet they are human and represent the uniformity of our humanity, we are all the same. The viewer is a participant in the painting, identifying with the individuals he portrays in the paintings.





The great masters of Western art are literally incorporated into the paintings of Alvar at various times. Look at his Last Supper painting and you will find Michelangelo's architectural rendering of St. Peters Basilica cleverly held by one of the apostles. Take a look at the Annunciation painting and you will see a miniature version of Fra Angelico's painting from 1438. In Alvar's Nativity painting, he places a small copy of the Nativity painting by (add artist and year). Why does Alvar do this? He is giving homage to the great masters of religious art. He humbly asks if he can be associated with their history and profound impact upon the world. Alvar's paintings indeed shows us that he has the hand of a master from our day in his poignant and profound paintings depicting these treasured Bible tales.
